

NELL MEMBER OWNS AND CARES FOR PIECE OF LIGHT KEEPER'S HISTORY

Herb Carpenter and his wife Tracie, who are Charter members of NELL, own a piece of property in York, Maine just down the road from Nubble Light. On this piece of property is a small building that is now used for storage, but back in the early to mid 20's and beyond it was a local store. That store was opened by Captain James M. Burke who had been a lighthouse keeper in Maine and New Hampshire from 1886–1919, and retired from being the keeper at his last station which was “Nubble light”.

Shortly after Captain Burke retired he opened this fish and bait shop on Broadway, which also sold (according to the signs in an old photograph) ice cream, cold soda, and curiously, real estate. The old photo below is one provided by Herb Carpenter.

So how did Herb Carpenter come to own this special piece of historic property? Back in the late 50's Herb's grandmother Rachel B. Carpenter used to visit York every summer and when this property came up for sale she wanted to buy it and use the small building as a “camp” for the summer. As it turned out, family did not think it would be livable without electricity, plumbing etc.,

but the property was bought and Herb's father, Herbert S Carpenter III, designed and built a little cottage next to what had been the store. A back part of the store was in serious disrepair and was removed from the building, and the front porch area was no longer there, however the only restoration needed to keep the building in decent shape was to lift it and put a new floor in, which Herb's uncle and cousins did. Through the years, this property was kept in Herb's family and in 2010 Herb inherited a portion and bought the rest. Herb and Tracie have been keeping it painted and looking good though the years. Although there has always been a small sign on the front of the store naming it as Captain Burke Store circa 1926, recently Herb has decided to commemorate James Burke and his store with a new interpretive sign, to be installed later this spring. I will do an update on this article when it is installed and there are photos.

Below you will find a photo (provided by Herb Carpenter) of the sign that will soon be installed thanks to Mr. Carpenter's interest in having others know about this historic building. A few other photos of what the store looks like today were taken recently by me while visiting. One of the pictures is a wooden Captain Burke with a mask. It is always a good feeling to know that owners of lighthouse history sites are taking good care of them. As members of New England Lighthouse Lovers, we thank you Herb & Tracie for being good stewards of the history of Captain Burke.



Herb Carpenter also provided a few other interesting photos that I have posted here. The first two are of the inside on the “store” turned storage shed and next is a photo of a Masonic apron Captain James Burke owned and a telescope he used to use, presumably at the lighthouse.

Owls Head is my favorite lighthouse but Marshall Point is my favorite spot in the Universe. I feel so alive there. It's handy they are so close together.







Lighting the Way: How Lighthouses Illuminate American History:


In a slide-illustrated talk rich in maritime lore and brimming with original historical detail, Eric Jay Dolin tells the story of America through the prism of its beloved coastal sentinels. Set against the backdrop of an expanding nation, *Brilliant Beacons: A History of the American Lighthouse* traces the evolution of America's lighthouse system, highlighting the political, military, and technological battles fought to illuminate the nation's hardscrabble coastlines. Dolin covers a memorable cast of characters including scientists, soldiers, and government officials, but most importantly the male and female keepers who kept America's lighthouses burning. *Brilliant Beacons* is the most original history of American lighthouses in many decades.

Eric Jay Dolin Bio:

Eric Jay Dolin is the author of fourteen books, including *Leviathan: The History of Whaling in America*, which was chosen as one of the best nonfiction books of 2007 by the *Los Angeles Times* and the *Boston Globe*, and also won the 2007 John Lyman Award for U.S. Maritime History. His most recent book before is *A Furious Sky: The Five-Hundred-Year History of America's Hurricanes*, which was chosen as one of the best books of the year by *The Washington Post*, *Booklist*, *Library Journal*, and the editors at Amazon. Prior to *A Furious Sky*, he published *Black Flags, Blue Waters: The Epic History of America's Most Notorious Pirates*, which was chosen as a "Must-Read" book for 2019 by the Massachusetts Center for the Book, and was a finalist for the 2019 Julia Ward Howe Award given by the Boston Author's Club. A graduate of Brown, Yale, and MIT, where he received his PhD in environmental policy, Dolin lives in Marblehead, Massachusetts, with his family.

On the next page is an article sent by Bob Taylor about the Hudson–Athens Lighthouse that he has been involved with for the last 19 years.

How Do You StabilizeThe Hudson-Athens Lighthouse on the Hudson River?

The company, aquasurvey.com from New Jersey was hired to do an engineering study and in the process the company was looking for a way to advertise their ability to analyze a river bottom for advertising and to generate future sales. In February 2021 they asked a number of volunteers of the Hudson-Athens Lighthouse Preservation Society (HALPS) to come to Hudson to the Hudson Chamber of Commerce building to be taped one at a time in 40-minute intervals. Don't come early and you must leave when your time is up. They would then go back to NJ and edit and assemble the show. The NJ folks ask us questions as the camera was rolling. The lighthouse just lucked out as in addition to the survey we get a video of the process. Also we will get an engineering report on how to fix the problem. The analysis also includes divers, with the hose, to go down and examine the bottom piles.

There are multiple videos in this document. The very first one to click on is about the lighthouse at Alexandria Egypt which is considered to be one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. It is believed to have been 40 feet tall and was there for 1,500 years until it was hit by an earthquake in 1303. It directed boat traffic off the Mediterranean Sea into the major city of Alexandria, Egypt. It is reported that slaves carried wood to the top and a fire was lit as the source of lighting. In recent years divers have located it in the sea and of course some folks want it brought back and assembled.

The next level down on the left is the Hudson-Athens story and the video on the right is the Lidar technology and its application. The different colors indicate the depth of the water. Maximum is 30 feet.
