

Some NELL members have been out visiting lighthouses as things open up. Here is one story of a trip taken by several NELL members written by Sherri Roberts of Plymouth, Massachusetts:

A few of us, Jim Malone, John Hopp and I, went on a cruise recently to view and photograph some lower Chesapeake Bay lighthouses. We took a charter out of Gooatee Marina in Church Creek, Maryland. Phil Gooatee was our Captain. It was a raw, windy Sunday of Memorial Day weekend. We didn't encounter much rain, but it was windy. We left just before 9am and headed to (1)Hooper Strait modern light, then onto (2) Shark Fin Shoals modern light, (3)Solomon's Lump and (4)Holland Island Bar modern light. (Capt Phil reversed the order he would normally run this trip to keep us out of the winds, hoping they would come around by the time we hit our southern most point).



Then across the Bay and into (5)Virginia waters to see Smith Point Lighthouse. It was relatively calm up to this point, using the land to protect us from the winds. The wind came around some, but not as much as Capt Phil was hoping for. As we were crossing the mouth of the Potomac River we encountered a flood tide. The flood tide in combination with a perpendicular wind direction made an interesting crossing. We took some decent size waves and everyone ended up in the cabin to stay dry. Every once in a while Capt Phil yelled "Rogue Wave- hang on" as he cut our forward momentum so the boat slid up and over the big wave that was coming from the side.



Once we crossed the Potomac River we were at (6)Point Lookout Lighthouse, this was the only light we weren't able to get very close to because of the waves, wind and tide. Just a bit further we got great shots of (7)Point No Point Lighthouse.



Then back across the Chesapeake Lighthouse and a quick run to the marina. The marina has been in the Gootee family for three generations, his grandfather dug the original marina in 1956 and continues to be in his family. We met Phil's father when we returned. It is a very nice and friendly family-run business. The marina is in a very scenic and historic area with the Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge and the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad National Monument nearby.

We chose to forgo lunch on an island to have more time on the water photographing lighthouses. After all that is why we drove to Maryland in the first place. The really great thing about this day was we didn't have to contend with fishing charters and sailboats out on the bay or around the lights we were photographing. The waters were fairly calm around each light. Capt Phil kept us circling the lights and putting us in position to get the exact shot we were wanting.

I think most would have cancelled our trip. We pretty much had the whole of Chesapeake Bay to ourselves. I would highly recommend Capt Phil. In addition to his knowledge of the waters, he has a wealth of historical knowledge of the area and interesting anecdotes about the Chesapeake and the Bay lights.


These same NELL members (Sherri, John, and Jim) joined Sharon & Bob Mills and Bob Lilly on a cruise out of Bath, Maine this past Saturday (June 26) that passed 10 lighthouses: Doubling Point, Doubling Point Range, Squirrel Point, Perkins Island, Pond Island, Sequin Island, The Cuckolds, Ram Island, Burnt Island and lastly Hendricks Head Light. The day had been forecast to be cloudy, but as often happens in Maine it changed and we had a lot of sunshine and then toward the end were in thick fog for a while. Even though the waves were a bit high out in the ocean, we were able to see Sequin as close as possible. The highlight of the day was landing at Burnt Island, having lunch there, and getting the opportunity to climb the tower at a time when it isn't generally open to the public. We went on the cruise with Captain Gary of River Run Tours. For several months there has been a special feature in NELL NEWS that highlights the life of one of our Board of Director members. This month that board member is our Preservation Co-Chair and past Membership Chair, Walter Mills. In his own words, Walt shares what he has done in his life and some of his lighthouse/NELL history:

As a child I visited the shoreline in Guilford, CT and saw Faulkner's Island Lighthouse from a distance. I was fascinated and hoped to visit it someday. Eventually the love of the ocean drew me back to Guilford where I built a home in 1978. I joined Faulkner's Lighthouse Board of Directors for 3 years (2000-2003) and assisted with annual open house events & transportation to the island. During that time Faulkner's Lighthouse celebrated its 200th birthday in 2002.



As a co-owner of the Lynwood Inn in York Beach, Maine (since 1987- present), a half mile from Cape Neddick Light (Nubble Lighthouse), I visited the lighthouse in every season. There I made my first phone call to my future wife, Laurel.

Laurel and I worked as colleagues on projects for ACES (Area Cooperative Educational Services) in Hamden, CT where I taught Technology Education, Woodworking, Electricity, and Drafting at Hamden High School. I taught in that district for 32 years in both the high school and middle school. Laurel knew of my interest and love of lighthouses throughout the years.

I met Barbara Hupp (who is now deceased) in October of 1998 at a Harbor Lighthouse event featuring Bill Younger, the Harbor Lighthouse artist & founder. Barbara talked about forming a New England lighthouse group and sought interest. A passionate group of us including Barbara, who became the first president of NELL and remained until 2002, met and the first meeting of NELL took place at Avery Point in November 1998. I have been a member of NELL since its inception. I attended meetings for several years and was nominated to be Membership Chair in 2007. I served in this position from 2007 until the summer of 2018. Presenting Membership reports was always a fun challenge due to overly zealous "incorrect" comments from my dear friend Frank Carbone.

Over the years I collected over 300 lighthouses and went to many lighthouse events but my eyesight was diminishing due to Macular Degeneration. Winters were dangerous for me because we didn't have sidewalks which made it very difficult for me to walk safely where we resided in Bloomfield, CT. So we decided to move to Colorado where winters were more appealing, weather was milder and sidewalks were wider. When we were getting ready to move to Colorado near Laurel's son, I had to make the sad decision to downsize my lighthouse collection to 40 favorite pieces. At that point we both had retired from education. We have been in Denver for the past 6 years and now are grandparents to a little girl, Cora, who lives nearby. We do miss the ocean and visiting lighthouses, and socializing with NELL members, but have enjoyed hearing familiar voices on ZOOM presentations. I now have to depend on Laurel's descriptions and my fond memories of lighthouses and lightships seen in the past. Hopefully I can attend other NELL trips in the future.


