

Another Successful LHC&Y event



On February 20th 27 members attended NELL's 2022 Lighthouses, Hot Chocolate & You (LHC&Y) event. The speakers and individuals associated with each location were most helpful in making this event very successful (including being willing to accommodate our need to change the date due to Covid).

It was a bright, sunny, but cold day. This was a very full day – as we made our way to 4 different locations:

Cohasset Maritime Museum where we viewed many artifacts from the Minots Ledge Lighthouse. Robert Jackman, a Cohasset resident who since 2003 has been teaching local history classes, gave a talk on the lighthouse including some little-known facts found in original documentation. Also



Jackie Dormitzer, chair of the Cohasset Historical Society, provided information about Government Island before we drove there to view and photograph the site.





Government Island was for many years the land station associated with Minots Ledge Light. Due to the difficulties associated with the construction of the light, its tower was actually assembled first on this site. The foundation area (construction rings) used for this purpose is marked in the small park. Also found on Government Island is a monument dedicated in 2000, honoring the two assistant keepers who perished in the original Minots Ledge Lighthouse in



1851. We also viewed a replica of the lantern room sitting on top of some of the granite blocks removed from the lighthouse during the renovations that were finished in 1989. Inside this lantern room is a third-order Fresnel lens once used in the lighthouse. Also displayed here is a fog bell and the oil house.



Scituate Lighthouse where lighthouse keeper, Bob Gallagher and president of the Scituate Historical Society and new NELL member, Bob Chessia told us many stories about this beautiful light. We were invited into the keeper's cottage where Bob Gallagher told countless stories about the light, the various shipwrecks that occurred over the years and the people involved with the light, especially Rebecca and Abigail Bates, daughters of the lighthouse keeper (also known as the American Army of Two) who frightened off the British from attacking Scituate in 1814. Hull Lifesaving Station Museum where we were given a tour of the Museum by Mike McGurl the executive director and docent DJ Simon. We learned about the history of the Lifesaving Station and were able to view some of the equipment used in the rescues.



Mike, who among other marine-based activities, operated a passenger vessel business in Boston Harbor, spoke to us about the importance of Boston Harbor light from the perspective of a captain operating vessels that needed to enter Boston Harbor.

At the end of the day we all enjoyed our refreshments – including the cookies provided by Courtney Bitto, Ellen Granoth, Colette Long, Sharon Mills, Sandy Peterson, Linda Sherlock and Arlene Winkleman. 

The featured Board Members this month are Norman & Cynthia Bosse. He is a Director-at-Large and Cyne is the correspondent.. In the 1940's Hampshire as a child and Cape Neddick, Maine. Norm & Cyne met and became sweethearts in 1951. Norm went into the Air Force after high school. He spent some time in Brownsville around 1953 and passing the Port Isabel island was all sand & beach.

While employed with them they moved to Georgia where Norm eventually got a job with Delta Airlines. He worked in Philadelphia, PA, Bangor, Maine and finally Windsor, Connecticut. After working for many years in maintenance at Delta he retired in 1993 and then started doing small jobs in the town of Windsor, Cyne was a driver for the Transportation department of Windsor, and also Caring Connections Day Care. For many years she took care of her home and family. Although they would see lighthouses occasionally, they didn't really start visiting them purposely until after retirement around the year 2000. Norm & Cyne were involved with the Harbour Lights collection group and attended a Baltimore Reunion in 2001 where they signed up to become NELL members. They have taken many trips to visit lighthouses through the years and have seen over 400 lighthouses. They have visited Michigan, the Outer Banks of North Carolina, the West Coast, Texas and as far away as Canada, Wales and Isle of Man in the U.K.

Some of their more memorable trips were:

a personal trip to Sankaty lighthouse, on Nantucket Island in 1999

A trip with the Harbour Lights group in 2005 to Mackinaw Island, Michigan.

They joined a trip in 2008 with the USLHS to Wales and Isle of Man. One of the things they remember from this trip is that the Queen only came over to Isle of Man once a year for one day from 8am to 4pm. Any laws that needed to be instituted had to be done during that time frame.



Another memorable trip was taken in September of 2009 to Nova Scotia and PEI in Canada where they saw Peggy's Cove light among many others. This was a trip planned by a retired Coast Guardsman, Dave Hannum, and was also attended by other NELL members. They remember starting this trip out of Portland, Maine.

In 2011 Norm & Cyne went on another USLHS trip out to California. This trip was also attended by other NELL members.



Another personal trip out to Nantucket Island in Cape Cod, Massachusetts was taken in 2012 where Norm & Cyne were able to go out to Great Point lighthouse.

On one of their many trips they went out to Minnesota and visited the Split Rock Lighthouse area. Cyne and her cousin who was with them walked down the stairs/pathway to the waterfront where the Iron Ore Boats used to dock. She bonded with Lake Superior as she put her arm up to her elbow into the water. Split Rock is Cyne's favorite lighthouse



In the year 2014 Norm & Cyne took a USLHS trip down to the Outer Bank area in North Carolina, where they also saw the "Old Baldy" lighthouse.



In the year 2015 or 16 they traveled to the "Nubble" Lighthouse in Maine the Saturday after Thanksgiving Day in order to see the annual Christmas lighting of the tower and keeper's house. They were also witnesses to a tradition of scuba divers who place a Christmas tree on the bottom of the ocean that is brought up during the celebration lit with Christmas lights. This year one of the divers was a friend of Norm & Cyne's son. The "Nubble" Light is Norm's favorite lighthouse.

In addition to their lighthouse trips both Norm & Cyne volunteered at Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse open houses and other events and have been on the board of NELL for several years. OTHER LIGHTHOUSE ITEMS OF INTEREST IN NEW ENGLAND & BEYOND

In mid January – the 17th to be exact – a storm with high waves did some damage to the Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse site. Fortunately the lighthouse tower itself was not damaged, but a few other things were flooded, broken etc. The Friends of Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouses storage shed on the premises was flooded and a couple of boxes of brochures and about 72 copies of the book “Friendly Edifices” were lost. Most of the merchandise had been moved to a different storage unit in Portsmouth for the winter.

A hinge on the oil house door was broken, a step on the stairs that go to the oil house was swept away and a slat on the walkway was broken. The basement of the keeper’s house was also flooded and the Coast guard lost equipment that was stored there. I thank Jeremy D’Entremont for the details of the damage and for providing a few photos. The first three photos were taken by LCDR David Bourbeau, U.S. Coast Guard. The photo showing the books was taken by Jeremy. The 1st photo was taken during the storm, the 2nd shows flooding around the keepers house and the 3rd shows the Friends storage shed and a smaller shed that was floating around while the grounds were flooded.
