National Lighthouse Museum

ST. GEORGE — After many delays and almost succumbing to a \$25,000 budget shortfall, the National Lighthouse Museum has finally secured a building in Staten Island and plans to open its doors in August. Linda Dianto, executive director of the museum, confirmed the organization has raised enough cash to make the museum a reality. "It's all ready to go, it's just a matter of straightening out some of the administrative details," Dianto said. "It's time for celebrating." The museum has recently faced several stumbling blocks that could have killed a deal with the city's Economic Development Corporation to finalize the lease for 5 Bay St., known as "Building 11" in the former base of operations for the Coast Guard's lighthouse services.

In the last week of December, the museum still needed to raise \$30,000 to afford the \$350,000 lease.

After successfully raising the money, the city told museum chiefs it still fell short of \$25,000 which had been allocated to it by Assemblyman Matthew Titone, but had yet to reach its bank account, Dianto said. However, after another fundraising campaign in January, the museum was able to raise an extra \$50,000 and Dianto said she's finally in the planning stages for a soft-opening later this year. "We are now in the process of proceeding with the architects and have them start working," she said.

The museum plans to open the first part of the site on Aug. 7, 2014 to mark the 225th anniversary of the Lighthouse Act of 1789, which gave the federal government control of the country's lighthouses. It will have a timeline of lighthouses, a database of all lighthouses in the world and a place where people can research the history of keepers, Dianto said. "It's just going to be amazing coming down the road," she said. "It's great that we're bringing the Staten Island community to the waterfront."

The borough was chosen to host the National Lighthouse Museum in 1997 after the city won a national contest, but the project was long delayed. It went through several directors and had trouble raising enough cash.

But after nearly 17 years, Dianto said she was excited to finally bring the history of lighthouses back to Staten Island. "The history is important and Staten Island really is the heart of lighthouses," Dianto said. "I think we deserve it and it's worth fighting for. We have the history and it's worth preserving."

Japan

Conventional lighthouse lamps are being replaced with light-emitting diodes across Japan.

As LEDs consume less energy than conventional bulbs and last much longer, the changeover is expected to reduce maintenance costs.

According to the Japan Coast Guard, replacement work has been completed at 2,528 of the nation's 3,224 lighthouses. The nation's oldest brick lighthouse now uses LEDs and reflectors, instead of incandescent lamps and large lenses, which were replaced in September.

Located on a remote island off the coast of Toba, Mie Prefecture, the Sugashima lighthouse was designed and constructed by British engineer Richard Henry Brunton. It began operating in 1873. It has since been registered as a tangible cultural property and an industrial modernization heritage site in Japan. Built of domestically-produced white bricks, the Sugashima Lighthouse is styled in the manner of a European castle round tower, complete with crenellations. It replaced a more primitive light established by to Tokugawa shogunate on the island in 1673 in response to numerous shipwrecks in the area The lighthouse was fully automated and has been unattended since July 1959. The 9.7 meter tall tower contains a fourth order Fresnel lens. The lighthouse uses 360 LEDs to cast a light for about 14 kilometers, just over half the 27 kilometers it reached before the changeover.

The 4th Regional Coast Guard Headquarters says there are no problems with the shorter distance, because lighthouses have become less important thanks to advances in global positioning systems.

Friday marked the 145th Lighthouse Day in Japan. Established in 1949 by the then Maritime Safety Agency, the Japan Coast Guard's predecessor, the day commemorates the start of construction on the Kannonzaki lighthouse, the first Western-style lighthouse, at the entrance of Tokyo Bay on Nov. 1, 1868.

Brunton constructed a total of 25 lighthouses in Japan from far northern Hokkaidō to southern Kyūshū during his career in Japan, each with a different design.

Lighthouse project Friday, November 15, 2013

A TEAM of officials from the Government Shipping Services will soon be deployed to construct navigational beacons in Natovi and Nabouwalu waters.

Works and Transport permanent secretary Commander Francis Kean said this project would continue in other parts of the country including Kadavu, Vanuabalavu, Koro, Ovalau and parts of the Western Division.

"This is a one-month deployment when officials will construct beacons in Natovi and Nabouwalu. We are also looking at other areas in the country and this will be an ongoing project next year," he said.

"This is something we are concentrating on for the purpose of providing safe navigation for ships. This is also a government-funded project aimed at improving our maritime zones."

Commander Kean said they were working closely with the Maritime Safety Authority of Fiji for the construction of lighthouses and beacons around the country.
