The **MARITIME MUSEM** in downtown Cohasset will be open for NELL to see the history and artifacts from Minot's Ledge Lighthouse along with other local maritime history.

Later in the day participants can travel to the Cohasset Sailing Club on their own to see the old Minot's Ledge Lighthouse Lens and a Memorial Bell at the same location. You will also be able to see the current Minot's Ledge light at a distance. In addition there will be a small fee for attending this event, so checks can be given to the museums.

All this is in the planning stages now so exact dates, times, cost etc. will be sent separately when the plans are finalized. In the meantime, save the dates and if you want to be part of the cookie contest, think of what you might want to bake.

Bob Taylor lives in Pittsfield, MA. He is retired from Pittsfield High School where he was a math and computer teacher and also Berkshire Community College in Pittsfield, MA where he was a professor teaching computers and serving as an Academic Advisor. After retiring from fulltime work at Berkshire Community College he worked part time also at Hudson Valley Community College in Troy, NY for a decade as his "Retirement Fun Job". Bob started collecting Harbour Lights in 1995 when he bought his first replica of New London Ledge of CT from Lighthouse Depot. (see replica picture on left) Although Bob has seen and photographed approximately 1,300 lighthouses in the USA and



internationally, Hudson-Athens lighthouse located on the Hudson River in New York is the one he is most familiar with and has been volunteering there for 19 years. During that time he started following folks around and listening to those giving tours and taking many photos. That seemed to move into giving many talks in the area in libraries, a senior group at the local community college, 4 different volunteer recruitment shows to folks on each side of the Hudson River in Athens and Hudson. Bob did a podcast this year with Jeremy D'Entremont and two other volunteers (#93 on the USLHS site). He spoke on Zoom to the local DAR group during a monthly meeting, made post cards to sell and give to the 2nd graders from both sides of the river who come out to the light on a school field trip, assists with the newsletter to the members, did a one hour talk on FM97.4 radio show and spent 4 hours this summer at the light being recorded, picture and sound, which he was told that the Hudson River Maritime Museum is going to use in a movie

production of the remaining lighthouses on the Hudson River (their winter project 2021-22) By clicking on this link for the [Hudson Athens Lighthouse](#) you can see & hear the present problem with the foundation of the light. You will need to click "media" and then go to the video section and click on the colorful picture as you scroll down the page. The work was done by the professional company in NJ, Aqua Survey. The color cone indicates how much of the dirt and rocks around the wooden piles has been washed away. If you scroll further down you will also see a slide show Bob made to give folks, especially in the community about what is involved in making a lighthouse operate then and now. His other hobbies include photography and making badges and post cards for NELL.

“STORIES OF HARBOUR LIGHTS COLLECTORS CLUBS AND EVENTS ”

Bill and Nancy Younger As Your Host & Hostess

In 2003 the Tampa Bay Harbour Lights Collectors Club ran a two week trip covering the lighthouses of California, Oregon and the first three lights in the State of Washington. The organizer was none other than Derith Bennett. Derith is a lady who lives in FL and in 2002 was doing trips for the Tampa Bay Harbour Lights Collectors Club. The story was told that someone said to her instead of doing one day trips to a lighthouse why do you not do a REAL trip. So she organized a trip from San Diego, CA to the state of WA covering most of the lighthouses in CA, OR and the first three lights in WA. She worked out the numbers to include 3 meals a day, a rented bus and a bed to sleep in each night. It was advertised to the FL folks, but only 40 folks signed up. To make the numbers work she needed 46! Somebody in NELL, probably Ron Foster, was asked to spread the word that New Englanders were welcome and it resulted in Ron & MJ, Ron and Shirley Drummer, and Tom Pregman and myself from NELL signing up for the trip of a lifetime.. She is very capable and now in retirement seems to be travelling around the country exploring many things including lighthouses and seems to post daily on Facebook.

Not wanting to hold up the trip, the six of us flew to San Diego a day early and booked into Derith's starting hotel. Somehow word got out to the Youngers that we would be there a day early and there soon followed an invitation for supper on the arrival day for the six of us. Word also got out that none of us drove from New England, and even if we did have a car, we might get lost on those freeways. We soon received information that Nancy with her car, and Bill with his car, would be there to pick us up and chauffeur us to and from the restaurant.

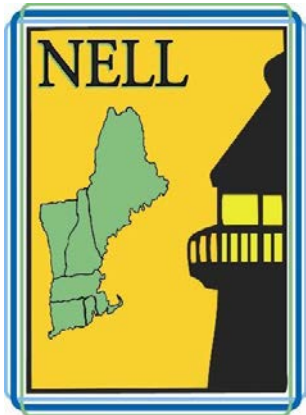
us to and we were told it came time for trust us and they family style. I size of half a football proceeded to cut each piece and so it went. the check was passed take care of things and for the night.



The next morning the Tampa Bay folks arrived and we all boarded the bus for our lighthouse adventure. That day for lunch we were taken to the Boll Weevil Restaurant where Bill and Nancy were already there to not only greet the bus but also to serve as part of the wait staff. The service was superb! When it came time to board the bus Bill and Nancy said they wished they could go with us, but they had a business to run. With customer service and appreciation like that it is no surprise that their business was a big success.

NELL (New England Lighthouse Lovers)

Harbour lights ran “reunions” for their lighthouse collectors (think family reunion or school reunion) around the country. At the Harbour Lights Reunion in October 1998 in Providence, RI, with over one thousand participants, there was a sign-up sheet placed out asking if lighthouse folks might be interested in forming a “Harbour Lights Collectors Club of New England?” Folks signed up and a notice was sent out which resulted in an organizational meeting being set up in November of that year at a restaurant in Andover, MA with 34 folks showing up for that meeting. Next was organized the first of what became annual events, namely a Spring lighthouse meeting with the first being held in Groton, CT at the University of Connecticut Avery Point Campus. The guest speaker for this first event was Elinor DeWire with a 35 mm slide show and talk on none other than lighthouses! This was followed up by a fall meeting in Portsmouth, NH where in addition to visiting lighthouses we had the pleasure of a talk by none other than Connie Small, a wife of a lighthouse keeper, who at the time was only 98 year of age! Thus the Harbour Lights Collectors Club of New England was off to a great first year.



Each fall we would say our good byes and “see you at the spring event” until one day we realized that lighthouses were operational all winter, even in the colder climates. Hence was born *Lighthouses Hot Chocolate & You*, an event in January with actual trips to lighthouses with ice, cold weather and snow. The first cool event was held in January 2001 in and around Scituate Lighthouse with a climb and visit to other nautical places in the area. This three event schedule continues to the present day.

Why the name change? Soon after the start of the club it became apparent to the officers that one could not use a copyrighted name and also be able to raise money for lighthouse preservation as a non-profit organization. The first president, Barbara Hupp, decided it was time to have a contest and come up with a new name. Of course with a new name, **NELL— New England Lighthouse Lovers**—we needed a logo to go with it and hence another contest. The winner was Ron Foster and is the logo to the left. There is an entire series of these logos, with the particular state in which the event is

being held, shown in a different color than the rest of the New England states. There is also a winter logo, an American Flag logo, etc. This new name and logo shown was born in 1999, and to this day is the club’s name and signature logo appearing on stationary, hat, coffee mugs, lunch pails, sweat shirts, etc. Google NELL and check it out.



Next Ron Foster got into the NELL badge business for each event. They were originally 2¼” and later became 3” in size, and now back to 2¼ . NELL’s first badge is on the left. Ron continued with the badge making until the Fall meeting in 2007 when I took it over. Ron next got into making post cards of lighthouses and that has also been taken over by me. On the right is the 2013 post card of Pomham Rocks, RI that I made.

NELL has also branched out over the years to schedule trips on the Saint Lawrence River and Delaware Bay, NJ looking at lighthouses. NELL’s past

Presidents have been Barbara Hupp 1998-2000, Ron Foster 2000-2004, Shirin Pagles 2004-2006, Tom Pregman 2006-2007, Tom Kenworthy 2007-2012, Bill Kent 2012- 2016, Greg Fitzgerald 2017, Ron Foster 2018 and Henry Winkleman 2019 - . NELL also has a MS. NELL and MR. NELL event each year in which individual members are recognized by the group for their contributions to NELL in particular, and lighthouses in general. On June 3, 2000 NELL hosted an evening dinner meeting with Bill Younger as guest of honor. This included stories and signing of Harbour Light pieces. In those days “Hatteras on the Move” was the piece to get.



Since its beginnings in that Andover restaurant in 1998, NELL has raised and donated to lighthouse preservation **\$170,000 as of January 2021**. Additionally, another Collectors Club came into being because the Youngers and their company, Harbour Lights, came to Providence, RI to share their love of lighthouses with others in the 3 day event.

Nell member, Sandy Peterson, who has been overseeing the silent auctions at our meetings and has agreed to be on the Fundraising Committee, received a special gift in early October and thought members of Nell might like to see a photo of it. A woman, Paula Horn, who came from Germany, was a quilter that was involved in a quilting group, and attended the church Sandy does, died recently. Sandy, because she was known to like lighthouses, was gifted with a beautiful Lighthouse Quilt that this woman had made in 2008/2009. As you can see, the Quilt has 16 squares that contain a different lighthouse each from around the world. They also have the name of the Lighthouse and country or State it is located in on the bottom of its square. Sandy told me the woman was very detailed and used paint on a few of the squares to make them more realistic.

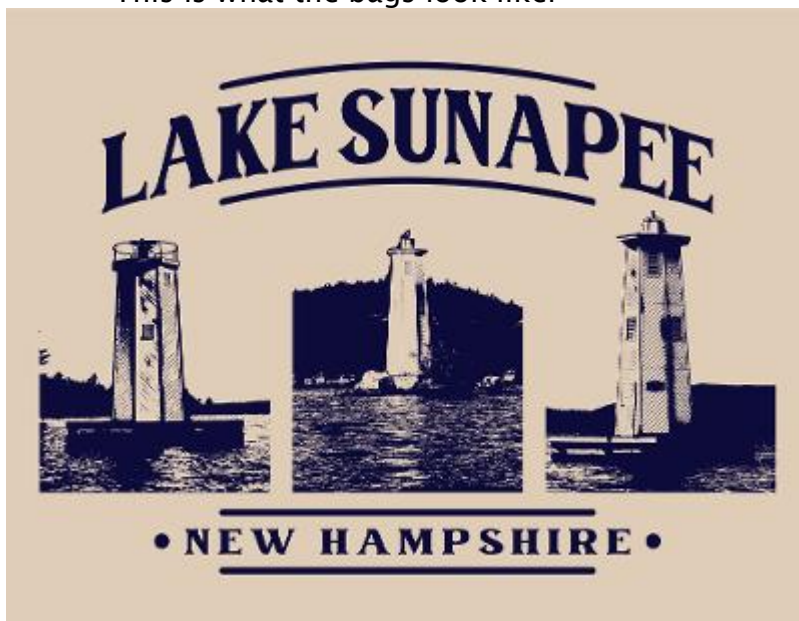

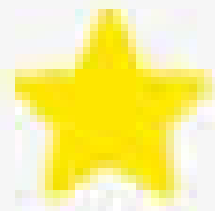
